Everything's Coming

A two month gallery display and five presentations highlight flowers as a signature and a way to celebrate life and life's occasions.

The Cultural Activity Center has been a central focus of art and cultural achievements in Temple, Texas for fifty years. With a new Director of Development to the "Art in Bloom" concept, discussed for quite sometime, was brought to task with an invitation to showcase the design talent of TSFA Past President Norman Northen TMFA and feature TSFA member Seleese Thompson's store Precious Memories. An overall display, titled "Everything's Coming Up Roses" opened January 8th in the Carabasi Gallery with a monumental crowd in attendance. The exhibit will extend to February 26th.

Additionally, five programs were presented to support the display and create a center of activity all about flowers with each personalized with stories about the ninety women to be honored. Three presentations were for associations, that meet at the center, thus becoming their program for the month. Plans were set in place with opportunities for the future being discussed.

The first of these centered around a group who have forever been referred to as the "Pink Ladies." They met at 5 o'clock in the evening on each and every Friday night to avoid the Friday night lights of the football games that consume Texas in the fall of each year! It was truly a gathering of "Silk Stocking Row," often referred to as the "Sewing Club," with one member darning her husband's socks so it would appear so if they were checked on. As told, the name, "Sewing Club," was decided since it could not be called the "Drinking Club" even though that's what really took place! The designs were in shades of pink with roses provided by Rio Roses and Southern Floral Company.

The second highlighted Women of Influence in Arts and Education honoring Temple Educators. Women of Influence in Literacy were recognized for the difference they have made in the community. Scholarships, provided through the Foundations that each represent, elevate the success of others. There is no doubt that these women have truly educated the community.

The fourth provided a way for Norman to highlight his home town of Belton with a step back in time to visually tour downtown Belton as it was in 1966 when he was 10 years old. At that time there were many rules. There were only two places where you could cross the street. You could only walk on certain streets. You could not walk by the jail. Together the program took 42 stops honoring 21 ladies. Ladies, who were shop owners or worked in stores, who taught a young boy about customer service, offering items to sell in varying price points, the importance of style and that every woman had a signature color and most, a signature flower.

To wrap it up, the programming returned to "Everything's Coming Up Roses" with an enhanced feature "Let's Design It!" for the Garden Club and Master Gardeners. Rose designs took on a Texas twist. Temple is the Wild Flower Capital and so it seemed appropriate to add wild flowers with mention of Lady Bird Johnson and the connections made over the years!

The theme was most important in that 2022 is the 40th Anniversary of Precious Memories in that this was the theme that owner Melissa Baugh used when she opened the store. 100 attended on a Sunday that was Norman's birthday noting a coincidence in that 27 years ago he came to Precious Memories and started on his birthday! Those honored have celebrated his 48 years as a florist with loyal support.

This exhibit and highlighted programming showcased signature arrangements for the ninety women who have influenced a life as he has celebrated theirs with flowers, of course! Everything IS Coming Up Roses!

Rex and Malissa Baugh opened Precious Memories Florist and Gift in July of 1982, named for her grandfather's favorite hymn "Precious Memories". It all started on her washer and dryer in her laundry room at home, then moved to the 2 car garage. From there the shop opened in a free standing retail store, later doubling that space and finally ending up on South 31st Street which is the main thoroughfare in Temple and close to Scott and White Hospital.


Nineteen years ago, Seleese Thompson purchased the business and will celebrate 20 years of ownership in October of this year! She bought the former Beimer's Fine Jewelry building and renovated the space as the store's prime location. In October of 2021, Seleese opened a second location in downtown Temple as a 12 month Christmas Store with other seasonal gifts and flowers.

The store was named Retail Florist of the Year in 2007.

AWARD-WINNING DESIGNER KEN SENTER AIFD PRESENTS "THE DANCE OF THE EQUISETUM"



IT APPEARS THAT YOU TRULY LOVE THE ART OF COMPETITION. WHAT INTRIGUES YOU ABOUT THE PROCESS?

I have always enjoyed entering floral competitions. A competition offers the opportunity for you to reach inside and find your best. In doing so, the process assists you in truly evaluating your design while working to take it to the next level. Competition not only defines your ability but also opens you to new ideas that oftentimes change the way you look at a design. The experience also teaches you to focus, to work hard until it is done and most important, to not give up on an idea.

WHAT WAS YOUR INSPIRATION BEHIND THIS DESIGN?

When I decide to enter a floral competition, my approach is to first study the theme answering two important questions: What are they looking for? What are my strengths and weaknesses TSFA MEMBER AND DESIGNER EXTRAORDINAIRE, Ken Senter AIFD, has recently placed in the Top Five in three International Floral Competitions! These competitions include AIFD Foundation Design Contest "Just Make it Pretty," Florida State Florists' Association International Design Competition and the Canadian Academy of Floral Art Competition. TEXAS in Bloom features his CAFA award-winning design while sharing his insight into the art of competing!

in this category? Then, I begin the process of creating a theme oriented design that allows my creative juices to flow freely. The theme for CAFA was "Suspended."I titled my design "The Dance of the Equisetum."

DESCRIBE THE THOUGHT PROCESS, THAT FOLLOWS THE INSPIRATION, TO LEAD TO A WINNING DESIGN.

A strong competitor MUST understand the Elements and Principles of Design to achieve a high score. Most of the time, my entries will feature texture, rhythm, line and contrast while also remembering color, proportion, etc. When I complete a design, I stand back and check off all the P&E's that I was hoping to spotlight. Another consideration is Mechanics Mechanics Mechanics. I cannot stress that enough! When competing you must present a professional finished design for the Judges to score.

THE TAKE AWAY MUST BE MUCH MORE THAN THE WIN. WHAT DO YOU TAKE AWAY FROM THESE EXPERIENCES? When I first started to enter floral competitions, it was a way to determine how my designs ranked with those of my peers. I never dreamed that I would place and certainly not win in that my goal was to simply advance my design ability to the next level. Along the journey, I discovered a most important bonus. Those competing become life long friends. This is a little different with virtual competitions since you are not standing next to your peers. The bonus here is that the virtual competitions have international presence. Competitors from around the globe raise the bar to where you quickly see just how your work ranks among that of your peers.





STEPS TO THE DANCE OF THE EQUISETUM

My first thought was to find a large piece of wood that I could suspend a design from. The stump I chose featured a very static line so I began to look for a branch that would offer a more dynamic line to create movement. The Kudza vine fit perfectly!

I drilled holes into the tree section and tied the Kudza into place. Then "Mechanics! Mechanics! Mechanics!" I hid the two drill holes with scabiosa pods.

Then came time to pierce holes into the Equisetum and secure each piece onto a heavy gauged wire. Take a look at the pictures above!

To create movement, I rotated the sections around the wire.

The Phalaenopsis orchids were added using cold adhesive glue.

Lastly the Jasmine was added to create a whimsical feel.

A photograph was taken and emailed so that I could see what the camera saw! Once happy with the results, I hit the send button to enter, congratulated myself and waited for the results! Was I ever so happy to place Second in the Top Five in CAFA International Competition!

In this new day of Virtual Competitions, one of the useful tips that I learned was from Charlie Groppetti AIFD. Before you submit a finished photograph to enter

the competition, send an email of the photograph to yourself. Open it and study the design for this is what the judges will see. In virtual competitions, judges do not have the luxury of experiencing the design in three dimension. They see it as the camera sees it. At a first glance, I always find crossing lines, depth issues, small problems with balance and so on. This simple task of emailing the image provides what you need to fix those problems and then take a new photograph and resend it to yourself. Repeat this process until the design is all you want it to be. Once you are happy and feel it reflects your best then hit send! Hitting the send button is such a rush. Then sit back and take a moment to congratulate yourself for entering. We do not take those moments enough!
