

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FROM BUD TO BLOOM

2023 TEXAS DESIGNER OF THE YEAR COMPETITION HIGHLIGHTS TEXAS TALENT DURING THE TEXAS FLORAL EXPO

The Texas Designer of the Year Competition was a great success. Ten designers from all over the state of Texas competed for the title of Texas Designer of the Year. Martha Aaron AIFD from Sedona, Arizona, who was preparing for an upcoming competition, also joined in the fun! Each designer brought their best and we express our appreciation to each competitor for sharing their incredible talent during the Texas Floral Expo!

The 2022 Texas Designer of the Year, Mary McCarthy AIFD TMFA, chaired the competition and selected "From Bud to Bloom" as the 2023 theme. This theme highlighted the mysterious and beautiful journey that flowers and foliages take throughout their life cycle.

The first two categories were held on Friday, of the Texas Floral Expo, with each competitor having the same mechanics, flowers and foliages. The first category was to create a vegetative design. Each competitor was given a container and thirty minutes to complete the design. The second category was Interpretive Design. Each competitor provided a prop as the basis of this category. The same flowers and foliages were available as well as forty five minutes to complete this design. Each prop was well thought out and beautifully made with creativity, in both categories, unparalleled.

The final category was held on Sunday of Expo weekend. This category was a Surprise Situation. Mary asked the competitors to create a wedding bouquet to include an armature. The contestants had one hour to complete this final category. Those who experienced this display of talent were inspired by the creativity of these retail florists, studio designers and floral design teachers. Texas is truly blessed with talent!



We were thrilled when Abel González Mencio AIFD CFD PCFI TMF from La Feria, Texas won first place and was declared the 2023 Texas Designer of the Year. He received the official Texas Silver Cup, First Place Ribbon, \$1,000 cash prize, \$1,000 Scholarship to represent TSFA in the Sylvia Cup during the Society of American Florists Convention and was named a Star of Texas. Abel has been in the floral industry for more than 45 years. He began his career at a very young age as a floral delivery driver and has, through education and hard work, grown to become our 2023 Texas Designer of the Year.

THE EARLY YEARS

What is your first memory of flowers?

My first memory handling flowers is of creating Homecoming Designs incorporating Fresh Football Mums back in 1979 for my high school friends.



What event/experience led to your interest in the floral Industry?

Working as a delivery driver for a small-town floral shop and seeing the expressions on people's faces when I would hand deliver their orders. It was then that I realized that I delivered happiness and I wanted to be a part of the joy that only flowers could bring.

Share an experience that stands out in your early years in the floral industry?

I recall working long holiday hours under the direction of Pam Fuller in Harlingen, Texas. Working at her shop afforded me the opportunity to present a design show at Southern Floral Company in Houston that catapulted me feet first into presenting, designing, and meeting some of the industry's finest people. I will always remember my first presentation and the nerves experienced at the onset and the adrenaline rush that followed and led to wanting more.

Your favorite job in the floral industry?

I would have to say working for ACOLYTE Designs, LLC was the highlight of being in the industry so far. It afforded me the opportunity, to not only travel the continental United States for trade shows, showroom setups, events and meetings, but also allowed me to meet the giants in our industry. Without this opportunity, I would never have known about the amazing educational resources that are available. Acolyte provided a "light" during a dark time in my life, one where I realized I had to determine my future. I am grateful to Masa Yamazaki for affording me that opportunity to interview in New York City that led to a whirlwind of touring, presenting and the continuation of my floral education.

Your present employment and what you like best about it.

I am the owner and Floral Design Engineer at Casa Granada Floral in La Feria, Texas. A unique design studio concept that allows me to create and design per customer requests. I have the freedom to be as creative as possible while meeting my clients' budgets. One of Casa Granada's trademarks is sharing a photograph of the design, prior to it leaving the studio, thus allowing the customer to see exactly what they are sending, acknowledging their approval and thus being a part of the process. This small detail sets us head and shoulders apart from the rest when it comes to quality customer service and is reflected in our perfect online ratings. Another distinction where Casa Granada stands out is our Annual Homecoming Mum Reveal Parties, where order pickups become a true event. We provide light refreshments for the customers and their parents, while we reveal their individual and unique designs to wear. Since 2017, we are the first to offer reveal parties in South Texas and it has become quite the anticipated annual affair.

Her love, respect, compassion and support of my career and business molded me into the man that I am today.

My favorite Industry Highlights were serving as Director of Marketing and Design for Acolyte Designs, LLC where I coordinated event and catering trade shows across the country while meeting some amazing clients and establishing numerous business partnerships from all over the world. My most memorable industry highlight would have to be Designing an award winning illuminated table scape for the Partners' Expo at the 2014 AIFD Symposium in Chicago where I was also fortunate to meet my floral idols Hitomi Gilliam AIFD,

Phil Rulloda AIFD, J Schwanke AIFD and René Van Rems AIFD.

INTEREST IN COMPETITION

It appears that you truly love the art of competition. What intrigues you about the process?

The capability to design "off the cuff" with the unknown is both thrilling and mind blowing to me. Walking into a room with just your tools and not knowing the products always amazes me. One's creativity and limits are boundless and pushing yourself to create something artistically beautiful is all within your mind and limited only by time. I am a firm believer that you only improve your game by playing with better players.

What was your inspiration behind the designs that led to First Place?

My inspiration has always been to do something different and unexpected. I realized that flowers should be represented in 360 degrees, where the judge could see the completed design without having to physically walk around the table, I considered flowing movement as if the wind were blowing so that all sides were visible. My thoughts were then how to create that surprising aspect of MOVEMENT.

I recalled that many years ago, while attending the 2014 AIFD Symposium in Chicago, I noticed that all of the tablescapes were without movemnet. I designed a tablescape for Acolyte with a very small battery-operated turntable where I placed a bubble bowl of roses, curly willow and glittering butterflies. As the design rotated, the butterflies seemed to dance skyward. It was magical and in reflection, I just knew that I had to recreate this concept for Texas.

Describe the thought process, that follows the inspiration, to lead to a winning design.

Simply stated, "Practice Makes Perfect". You decide exactly what you wish to achieve when you practice manipulating florals and foliage time and time again. In playing with an array of materials you become more comfortable once the unknown materials are presented to you. Although the materials may be unknown, your understanding of elements and principles and your ability to make something beautiful that appeals to the judges helps to ensure a winning design.

The takeaway must be much more than the win. What do you take away from these experiences?

The thrill of competition is amazing, but so are the opportunities to meet other like minded floral artists who wish to push themselves and their creative abilities. In my eyes no one looses during these competitions, just by competing each is a winner in their own rights and should be respected as such. I feel honored to have won the Texas Designer of the Year Competition, but I am also humbled and share the win with the other contestants from across the state who came together for a weekend of education, camaraderie and friendly competition.





I wanted the Interpretive Design to have movement, to be able to turn and be seen from all angles. By utilizing a larger turntable with remote control it allowed the design to magically "float" and turn with the touch of a button just as the official time was called.



The Vegetative Design called for something drastic. I decided to flip the Smithers-Oasis Eco container upsidedown, thus minimizing the overall use of product and creating totally different vessel than all the other competitors in the room.



For the final surprise challenge, I found inspiration in the armature to complete the vintage bridal bouquet. Curly willow, hydragea and roses were featured but the design called for a new technique, one that I had learned just the night before in Hitomi Gilliam's class. I sat down on the design room floor and took the time to pinch prune each vine of Italian ruscus to leave only the spine and thus utilized that skeleton as my armature and grid.



What's Next?

Next for me is to continue my journey of learning in this ever-evolving industry, to proudly represent Texas at the Sylvia Cup Competition during the Annual SAF convention in Arizona, while also preparing for future in-person design seminars as well as becoming more involved with the AIFD Education Committee promoting the Association through my bilingual skills into Mexico and other Latin American Countries. I also wish to introduce more school aged students to floral design by working closely with the Texas school

districts to promote the beauty of florals, and lastly, as the 2023-24 Texas Designer of the Year, my yearlong goal is to become a true ambassador for the Texas State Florists' Association through promotion of not only the competition but the journey one undertakes to get there.

TSFA wishes Abel González Mencio all the best as his floral journey continues. Those attending the Texas Floral Expo celebrated his win from the moment it was announced. Congratulations!

Fabian Salcedo demonstrated his masterful execution of style and creativity before a crowd of TSFA members and guests on August 9th in Houston.

Thank you to Mayesh Wholesale Florist for sponsoring and hosting this "Texas Floral Spotlight". Fabian detailed the research involved when a customer requests an abstract theme or vision.

HE PRESENTED FOUR UNIQUE TABLETOP THEMES.



SANTORINI MEETS FRENCH COUNTRY

Setting the table with a blue and white French toile tablecloth and bone china, Fabian brought the vision to life with stunning arrangements of white fluffy lisianthus, tweedia, and olive foliage.

ZEN GARDEN MEETS ANIME

Arrangements in color groupings of orange, yellow and green. Fabian detailed how the custom-made boxes were constructed in house. Accenting each arrangement with stripped smilax that had been painted to coordinate, Fabian emphasized that the base coat must always be white. Then the desired color is sprayed as a second application. The final touch for this creative tablescape were origami birds placed among the smilax.



DESERT TEXAS ON THE ELEGANT SIDE

A native Texas tablescape with cholla wood, tumble weeds, smoke bush, mocha lisianthus, dried palm fans, dried sea oats and spanish moss. The mocha lisianthus was a perfect choice to complete a natural grouping that was perfect for a Texas tablescape.





TROPICAL GOTHIC MEETS SEXY UNICORN

Painted Anthurium and Swordfish leaves accented a fabulous grouping of color featuring blue, purple and black. Fabian detailed the painting technique he employed to create this stunning look. Number one, start with a glossy paint as a base. Then brush on the desired mica/chrome paint, which may be purchased from Amazon or any craft store. Fabrian also demonstrated inserting a metal rod through the poultry wire to allow the designer the ability to shape the poultry wire structure. This technique was implemented in the tablescape created for this event.

To create the pond's edge, the rocks were sprayed with clear coat so each would appear wet. The arrangements were designed in 9 and 11 inch Lomey trays. You may be thinking just how did she achieve the glistening color on those leaves! Each was sprayed with chrome paint and then again with Design Master's "Just for Flowers" in colors Hydrangea Blue, Delphinium Blue and Peacock. During our time at the Expo, Debbie goes on to expand on the technique while providing yet another!

"Be sure and let the chrome paint dry first, if you want the leaf to look like the one pictured but there is another option! If you spray the "Just for Flowers" on to wet chrome paint, it makes a beautiful crackle finish. I often use this technique on succulents in that it is a great way to sell succulents if they arrive in with blemishes.



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
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
